

A Guide To **EANS** Funding

The goal of EANS (Emergency Assistance to Non-Public Schools) funding is to address the effects COVID-19 has had on students and lessen learning loss.

There are two allocations for the EANS program:

EANS I

2.75 Billion

EANS I is \$2.75B allocated to nonpublic elementary and secondary schools under the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations (CRRSA) Act (Dec 2020).



- EANS I funding is prioritized to those non-public schools that enroll low-income students and are most impacted by COVID-19. Reimbursements for allowable expenses incurred since March 13, 2020 are permitted.

EANS II

2.75 Billion

EANS II is a second round of an additional \$2.75B allocated as part of the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act (March 2021).



- Under EANS II, a State Education Agency (SEA) provides services or assistance to non-public schools that enroll a significant percentage of children from low-income families and are most impacted by COVID-19. EANS funds may not be used to provide reimbursements for costs incurred by non-public schools.



How Can EANS funds be used?

EANS funding can be applied toward the following services:

- Training and professional development for staff
- Educational technology
- Redeveloping instructional plans, including curriculum development, for remote or hybrid learning, or to address learning loss
- Initiating and maintaining education and support services or assistance for remote or hybrid learning or to address learning loss
